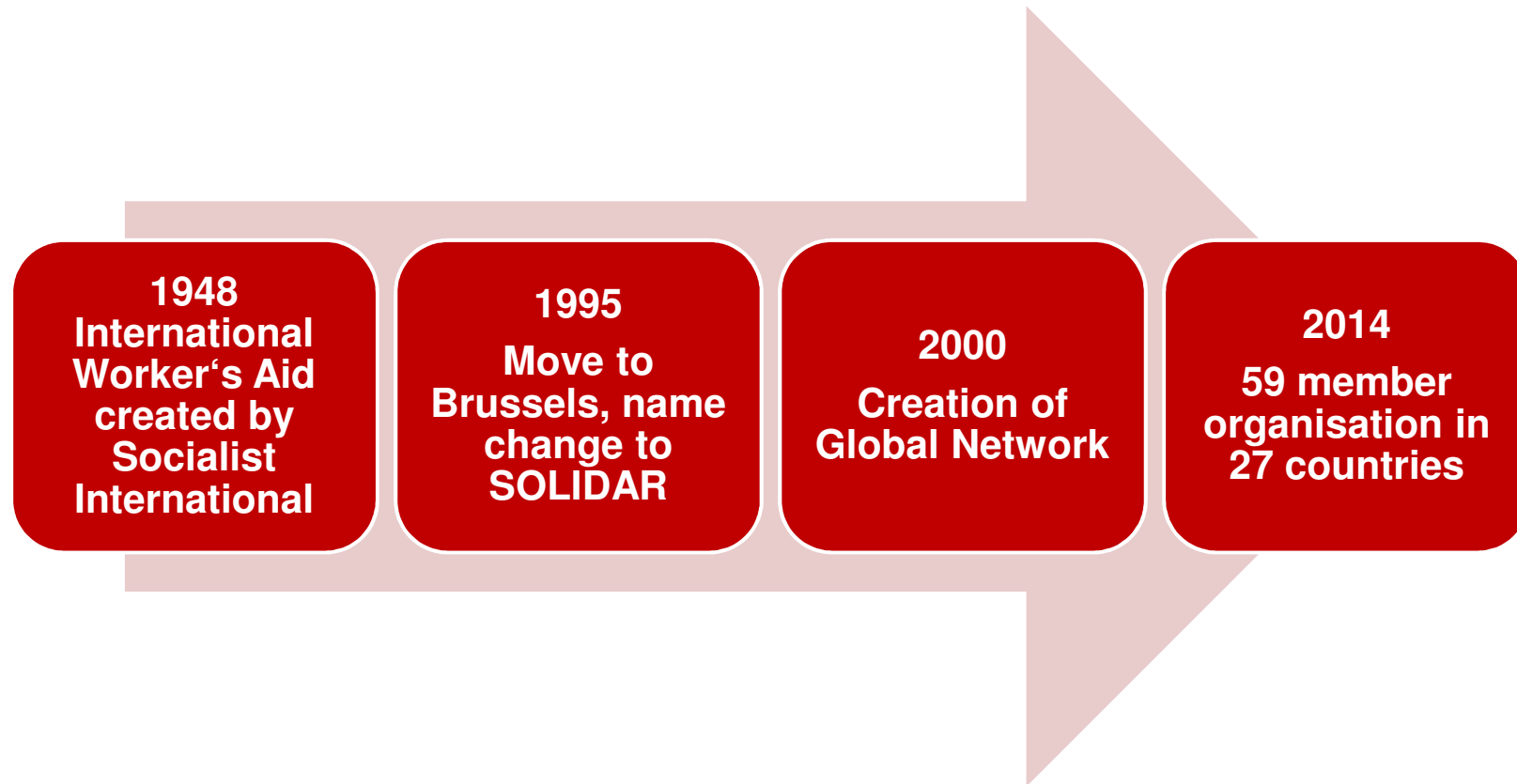

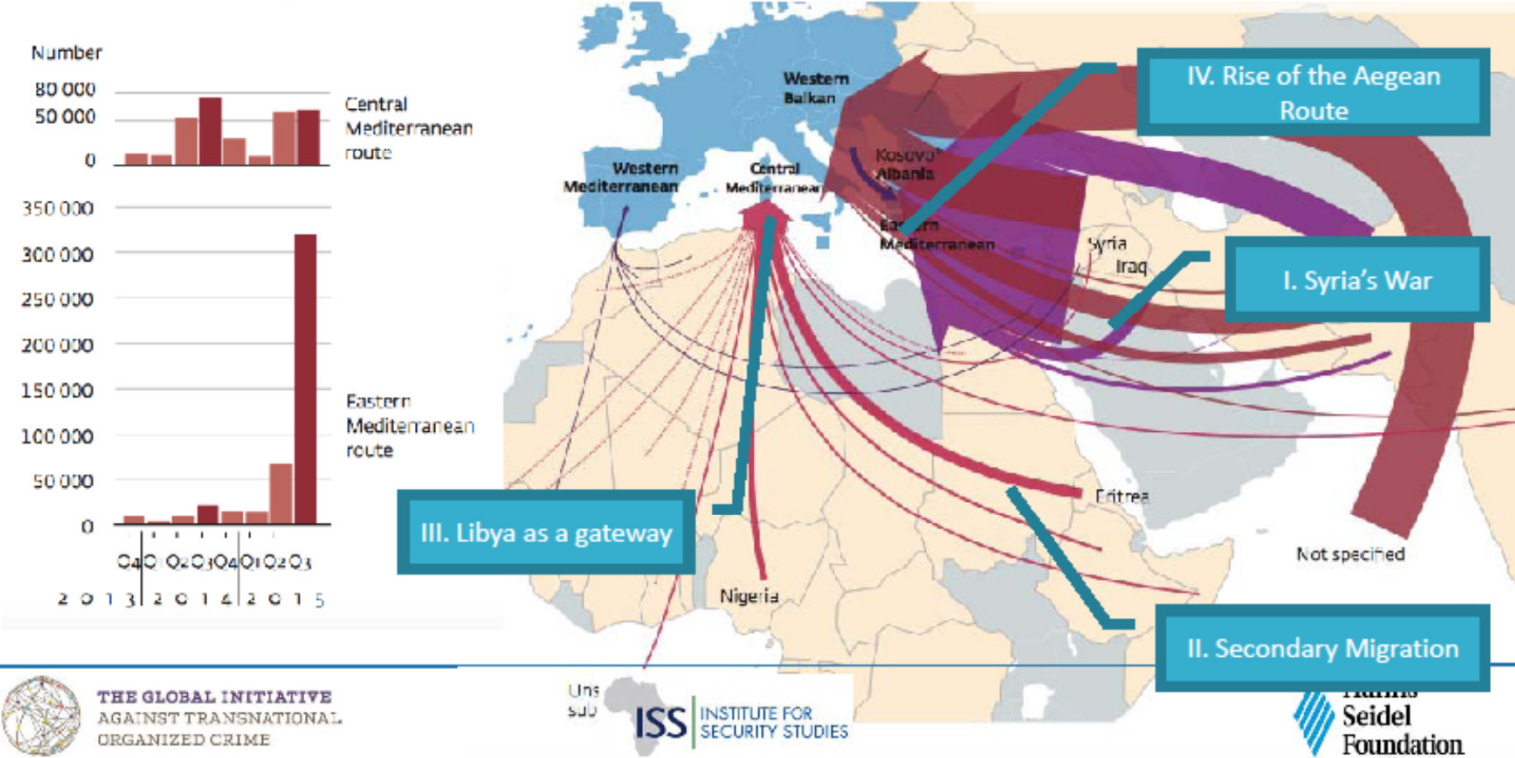

Migrant smuggling

Two typologies of migrant smuggling

1. Pay as you go

BOAT OPERATORS

Apply without boat can take a group of migrants. Objective just to put them in sea. No separate machine.

TRANSPORTERS

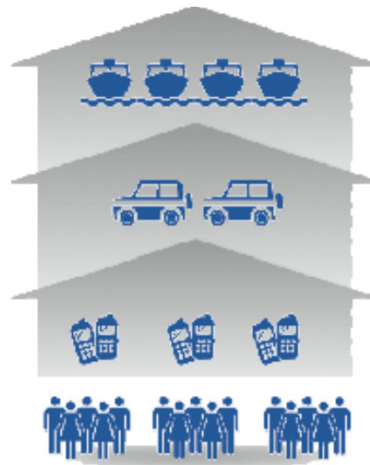
Specialized knowledge, e.g. how to cross the desert or 4000 km river. Detailed tactical orders or border officers on agencies. Will protect convoys using violence.

BROKERS/RECRUITERS

Drawn from local communities. Recruit new migrants, organize their first leg of transport, make contact with smugglers for next leg of journey.

SOURCE COMMUNITIES

May include migrants or be once exposed to migrants. Families collect the money, transport and send back earnings.



2. Full-package

CONTROLLER

Attended number of individuals who control most of the crew and may access to files.

CORRUPTORS

Individuals with extensive political relations in different countries and border crossing.

SPECIALISTS

Document frauds, money transfers, purchase of weapons and security services, providers of communication.

TRANSPORTERS

Individuals who manage the means of transport (boats, cars, trucks, coaches, etc.).

BROKERS/RECRUITERS

Smugglers who advertise the services like travel agents, based on promises of reliability and regular on her success.

INDIVIDUALS AND FAMILIES

Frequently full-package migration, can be well informed by their agents, and may be accompanied by family members, traveling together.

2013 Agenda for Sustainable Development

- 
- Revamps the co-development approach
 - Recognises positive contribution of migrants for inclusive growth and sustainable development
 - Protection labour rights for migrant workers

EC communication on the New Partnerships with third countries **solidar**

- Inspired by EU-Turkey deal
- Focuses on return and readmission
- Development as a way to control migration
- Increased conditionalities
- No clear commitment to promote safe and legal channels

European Consensus on development

solidar

- Revision to be adopted in 2017
- CSOs demands well-managed migration and human mobility
- Migration to be recognised as a positive element

Migration & Integration in the EU

Situation of TCNs in the EU

-

- 20 million third country nationals in the EU
 - 4% of EU population
 - Migration reasons:
 - Family reunification
 - Work
 - Studies/research
 - International protection
 - Higher risk of poverty and social exclusion

Asylum seekers in the EU

- In 2015: high influx of asylum seekers
 - **1,321,600** asylum applications
 - **307,620** positive asylum decisions
 - Asylum seekers & refugees more at risk of exclusion than other categories of migrants

Relocation mechanism

State of play (as of 21 September 2016)

-15,131 places made available by MSs

-1,156 relocated from Italy

-4,134 relocated from Greece

Rationale of the EC

- Human mobility to increase in the next decades
- Cost of non-integration higher than investment in integration
- Support to MSs in undertaking efforts to face increased arrivals

EU Action Plan on Integration



5 policy areas

- 1.** Pre-departure/ pre-arrival
- 2.** Education
- 3.** Labour market integration and access to vocational training
- 4.** Access to basic services
- 5.** Active participation and social inclusion

1 - Pre-departure/Pre-arrival measures

- Projects supporting pre-departure and pre-arrival measures for local communities (e.g. in the context of resettlement programmes)
- Strengthening cooperation with selected countries on pre-departure measures (e.g. Valletta process)

2 – Education

- Online language assessment and learning for newly arrived migrants (Erasmus +)
- Promotion of upgrading of skills of TCNs (Skills Agenda)
- Promoting removal of barriers for participation of migrant children in early childhood education and care

3 – Labour Market integration & access to vocational training

- Support validation of skills and recognition of qualifications (NARIC Centres - Skills Agenda)
- Pilot projects to support migrant entrepreneurship
- Promotion of best practices for labour market integration

4 - Access to basic services

- Strengthen cooperation with EIB to fund temporary accomodation/health facilities/social housing
- Develop training modules for health professionals to upgrade capacities to deal with TCNs specific health & care issues
- Promote exchanges between Member States and cities on housing issues

5 – Active participation and social inclusion

- Promote intercultural dialogue, cultural diversity and European common values (Creative Europe)
- Promotion of social inclusion through youth and sport (Erasmus +) and participation in cultural life
- Promotion of actions to combat discrimination, racism and xenophobia

EU Action Plan on Integration

- No clear commitment to fight cases of labour exploitation in the EU
- No clear commitment to extend political rights to all residents
- Not enough attention to actions to fight xenophobia/discrimination
- Link with Pillar of Social Rights should be reinforced
- Involvement of CSOs?
